## WELCOME TO **Clarence Hylan Beavers Memorial Trail** Kings Park Unique Area

This trail honors longtime Huntington resident Sgt. Clarence Hylan Beavers (1921 - 2017). Beavers was a member of the U.S. Army's first all-African-American paratrooper platoon—the 17 valiant men of the 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion, known as 'Triple Nickles.'

The Triple Nickles, considered a "test platoon," hoped to deploy to Europe during World War II, but military leaders, fearing racial tensions, had other plans for the paratroopers. The USDA Forest Service requested their help parachuting into northwestern U.S. forests to fight the fire threat caused by Japanese incendiary bombs as well as naturally-caused fires. In the summer of 1945, the secret "Operation Firefly" launched, with the Triple Nickles making hundreds of fire jumps.

Beavers and his platoonmates were true pioneers, blazing a trail that led to full integration of African-Americans into the military in 1948. The federal smokejumper program they helped advance is still a vital part of the nation's wildland firefighting efforts.


